

# How Chapters Can Get Involved in Prevention Insights from ATSA's Prevention Committee

#### Background

We, ATSA's Prevention Committee, are excited to support a growing number of ATSA Chapters who have expressed interest in getting involved in sexual violence prevention<sup>1</sup>. We believe that ATSA members can play a key role in contributing to discussions related to prevention efforts, particularly perpetration prevention, while acknowledging the pain that is caused to victims and survivors of sexual violence.

ATSA and ATSA members offer a unique perspective on efforts to stop the perpetration of unhealthy, harmful, dangerous and illegal sexual behavior. Preventing the perpetration of sexual violence is a part of the larger frame of prevention that others are beginning to acknowledge. We advance the conversation by offering information about what puts someone at risk for causing sexual violence and what may prevent the first-time perpetration of sexual abuse, and how to prevent further sexual abuse by those who have abused. The ultimate goal, and center point for our frame, is making our society a safer place to live for everyone

#### **Getting Started**

ATSA and ATSA's members have been working on prevention for decades, and we do not have to do this work in isolation. There are many others who have been working towards preventing sexual violence in our communities. Who are these potential key partners? To begin your work, we suggest that you start with an environmental scan of the key work that is already being done in your area – our advice to you is, be efficient and impactful; don't recreate the wheel.

Seek out statewide and local key partners and potential partners that may include:

- Sexual assault coalitions,
- State agencies (e.g., Department of Public Health, Department of Mental Health, Child Protective services and other state specific initiatives),
- Children's trust fund,
- County prevention task forces and county victim services
- Statewide organizations for child advocacy centers, legislative allies, etc.,
- Local rape crisis centers,
- Local child advocacy centers,

- Faith based programs, local mental health clinics and organizations, and other non-sexual violence specific programs, and
- Domestic violence shelters (even though their primary focus is not on sexual violence, the issues are largely intertwined).
- Your local police may have initiatives that address prevention.
- Other partners may include schools, youth serving organizations, colleges and universities, probation, sex offender management programs, etc.

- NSVRC (National Sexual Violence Resource Center) The NSVRC's Mission is to provide leadership in preventing and responding to sexual violence through collaboration, sharing and creating resources, and promoting research. Founded by the <u>Pennsylvania</u> <u>Coalition Against Rape</u>, the oldest and one of the largest state sexual assault coalitions, the NSVRC is funded through a cooperative agreement from the <u>Centers For Disease</u> <u>Control and Prevention's Division of Violence Prevention</u>. - <u>Prevent-Connect</u> is a national project of the <u>California Coalition Against Sexual</u> <u>Assault</u> with funding from the <u>U.S. Centers for Disease Control and</u> <u>Prevention</u> (CDC), <u>National Center for Injury Prevention and Control</u>.
